Previously Unpublished Bishop's Head *Groten* Struck for Jan van Arkel, Bishop of Utrecht (1342-1364), From the Hollandsche Rading Coin Find (2016)

Hoard Deposited: June, 1351 – January 1354 (or January 1355)? Found near Hollandsche Rading, The Netherlands Possibly originally deposited near Loosdrecht, The Netherlands Currently in the collections of various private individuals

The find consisted of the following coins:

107 silver (Ag) coins

33 *leeuwengroten* of Flanders, Count Louis of Male (1346-1384) (incl. broken coins)
73 *groten* of Utrecht, Bishop Jan van Arkel (1342-1364)
1 *groot* of William V of Holland (1350-1389) (unassociated?)

In the autumn of 2016, a number of silver coins were found in the vicinity of Hollandsche Rading, The Netherlands, by a metal detector user. In the following weeks and months, other detector users uncovered more coins in the same field. Up to March, 2017, a total of 107 silver coins were found in the same field. The coins had apparently been found in a layer of dirt that had been brought from some other location and deposited on the field to function as topsoil. The original location of the hoard (as deposited) is said to have been a nature reserve near Loosdrecht ^[11]. It is highly probable that the find does not represent the entire hoard, and that other coins remain either in the same field, or at some other location or locations, possibly including the original place of deposit (near Loosdrecht?).

The later finders found fewer and fewer coins, which seems to indicate that most of the coins from the field had probably been detected. But we can never know what happened at the original source of the dirt that was transported to the field by Hollandsche Rading, and how many other coins might have remained there (Loosdrecht), or been taken to some location(s) other than the Hollandsche Rading field.

The Hollandsche Rading coins were found by ten different metal detector users, most of whom wish to remain anonymous. For this reason, the finders are referred to by number, *vinders* 1-10 (for purposes of keeping track of the coins and photographs). The original find was made by Jan Ooms (Finder v 1), and his sons, Finders v 2 and v 3. Subsequent finds were made by other detector users. Finder v 4 decided to sell his coins without properly recording them, so the weights are unknown, and photographs of some coins were never made. Some of these v4 coins turned up later at auction; the auction photos are the best quality Hollandsche Rading photos that we have. ^[15]

In 2017, I was invited by Jan Ooms, the original finder of the "hoard", to give my input on the *leeuwengroten* in the find, coins with which I am eminently familiar. It was my understanding at the time that Paul Callewaert, author of the original determination reports for the find, was planning on publishing a report on the Jan van Arkel ("JvA") coins, while leaving me to publish a report on the *leeuwengroten*, which I did (ref. 15). No report on the Jan van Arkel coins was ever published, however.

When I realized that no JvA coin report had ever materialized, I contacted Jan Ooms to ask for photos of the coins, and he directed me to the Portable Antiquities Nederland (PAN) website, where, he assumed, photos of the coins could all be found. This, however, was not the case. Registration of the entire find had effectively ground to a halt in the red tape of some 76,000 other finds that must be registered with PAN. Only a small number of photos were visible on the website, and these were all very small, because the find has not yet been "verified", and so it was "on hold" in a sort of limbo until the volunteers at PAN could get around to dealing with it. (Clearly, this is just another case of insufficient funding and staffing for the job at hand, archeology, which is not high on the list of priorities of any government in the world).

Photos of some (not all) of the coins were eventually published on the PAN site. Photos that were not provided to PAN by the original finders were not included.

I realized that if I did not publish a report on the JvA coins myself, it was unlikely that anyone ever would. Upon closely examination, I discovered that there are at least six unusual sub-types that are not listed in v.d. Chijs (ref. 2), most of which went unnoticed by Callewaert in his report (ref. 1).

My own area of expertise is *leeuwengroten*, not bishop's head *groten* from Utrecht, which are, in effect, the *leeuwengroten* of Utrecht. I am unaware of any literature regarding these bishop's head coins other than v.d. Chijs' work, and I am equally unaware of any numismatist who could be considered an expert on these coins. (If there are any readers who would like to correct me on either of these points please feel free to contact me.) The original Callewaert report had to be abandoned due to various inaccuracies and repetitions. Its only value is the otherwise inaccessible photos of some of the coins.

Some Important Notes About The Photographs

Despite the best efforts of Jam Ooms, there was a lack of coordinated effort amongst the finders to properly photograph, weigh and record the coins before any dispersal occurred. Even in the 21st century, most coin hoards are still not properly documented.

The photographs of the Hollandsche Rading coins were made by several different people, in most cases, the actual finders of the coins themselves. They vary in color and contrast because of lighting and other factors, making it difficult to compare the "look" of the coins, so to speak.

Unfortunately, by the time I assumed responsibility for reporting on the non*leeuwengroot* coins in the hoard in late 2020, the original photos seems to have been discarded, have disappeared, or become unavailable. Since I was originally only responsible for the *leeuwengroten*, I never bothered to ask for the complete set of Jan van Arkel photos when I had the chance back in 2017 (which was an enormous mistake on my part). I never had any contact with any other the finders other than Jan Ooms.

My descriptions of many of the JvA coins are based solely upon the photos in the original, unpublished, .pdf report by Paul Callewaert; I have no other photos of these

particular coins, and despite repeated requests made to the other people involved, I never received the original photos from anyone. The photos in question were extracted from Callewaert's Adobe .pdf file report, and they are small and low-resolution, and it is difficult to see many of the details in some of them. I have done what I can with what I have, and if the other people involved do not wish to assist me, there is little more I can do but wash my hands of the entire matter.

Coins JvA-54 – JvA-72 were all photographed by the Munten en Postzegel Organisatie (MPO, now part of Heritage Auctions) for their 2017, May and November auctions, providing us with high-quality photos of these coins (only).

Jan van Arkel Bishop's Head Groten

There seem to be 3 basic types of JvA bishop's head groten:

Ι	MONETA TRAIEC	IOH EPC TRAIECTENSIS
II	MONETA DAVENT	IOH EPC TRAIECTENSIS
III	MONETA TRAIECT	IOHANES EPCS TRAIECTENSIS

Types I and II are basically identical; they seem to have been concurrent with one another, the former being struck at Utrecht and the latter at Deventer. Type III has noticeably different legends that the other two types.

Under these three basic types there are a number of sub-types with variant characteristics, such as differing interpunction in the legends, reverse inner legends beginning in different spots, or variant decoration on the bishop's mitre and/or collar, as well as differing symbols by the shield on the obverse.

Examples of all 3 of the basic types were found in the Hollandsche Rading Find. Several of the sub-types found in the "hoard" are not listed in v.d. Chijs (ref. 2). One of the coins was not photographed before being sold (JvA-73), and so we do not know what its characteristics were.

Most of the Type I, Utrecht *groten* have legends similar to the following (with some variation):

The Type II, Deventer *groten* are basically the same as the Type I coins, except that they have a reverse, inner legends that reads:

MON ETA DAV ENT

In addition, these coins have an eagle in the 2nd quadrant on the reverse, under MON:



On both the Type I and Type II coins, the **M** of MONETA (only) is Roman, and all of the \mathbf{R} 's are gothic. There are no round \mathbf{O} 's in the legends. The **E**'s in the reverse, inner legend are Roman (square), the **B**'s in the other legends are all gothic (or round).

The Type III coins are similar to the Type I coins, but have slightly different legends, more along these lines:

Abbreviations

Many of the partial words in the legends have *macron* bars over some of the letters, indicating the abbreviations. On most of the Hollandsche Rading coins, these *macrons* cannot be seen.

The Bishop's Mitre

I have not studied large numbers of bishop's head *groten*. It is clear that there are variations to the decoration on the bishop's robe and on his mitre, and it seems likely that the differences are some kind of intentional minting mark. In most (but not all) cases, the marks on the bishop's mitre appears to be the same marks that are used by the shield below, whether ***** or *****, although the trefoils "go the other way":

Bear in mind that the transcribed marks by the shield are upside-down when the coin is viewed properly, with the bishop upright:

Type I and Type two have 3 x's on the brim of the bishop's mitre, while Type III does not.

The Bishop's Collar

On most of the coins, the bishop's collar is decorated with 3 \mathbf{x} 's on each side, although there are some coins that only have 2 \mathbf{x} 's on each side. Unfortunately, there are coins with 3 intended \mathbf{x} 's, one of which one each side is weak, making it look like only 2 at first glance.

The Marks by the Shield



All of the Utrecht bishop's head *groten* have the arms of the bishop (in our case, Jan van Arkel) just below the main bust, as if the bishop were wearing an enormous medallion. The

shield itself does not change on the coins of Jan van Arkel, but the two symbols to the right and left of it do. Although the **shield** is not part of the obverse legend, in the following catalog the <u>symbols</u> around the shield are presented in transcription form. For example, this coin:



...would be represented by $\bullet \bigcirc *$, i.e. **TRA** $\bullet \bigcirc *$ **IECTEDSIS**, not by $* \bigcirc \bullet$. We are not showing what you see when you look at the illustration (photo), which appears to be a rosette to the left of a shield and a pellet to the right (which is the opposite of how the legend reads around the circumference of the coin), we are showing the symbols as if they are indeed part of the legend (which is a debatable topic).

In other words, the symbol in the transcription on the left comes after TRA, and the symbol on the right comes before IECTENSIS, with the shield between the two symbols.

There were basically two marks used: a 6-lobed rosette, and a pair of left-right, 3-lobed trefoils or leaves. The coin shown above as an example is a rare and unusual sub-type with a star and a pellet as marks. Some coins seem to have no marks at all by the shield

Errors, Anomalies and New Variant Sub-Types

As stated above, there are 3 basic types of JvA groten:

Type I	(IOH Utrecht)
Type II	(IOH, Deventer)
Type III	(IOHANES, Utrecht)

There seem to be a relatively large number of bishop's head *groot* coins known with unusual variations, for example, v.d. Chijs reports a Deventer coin with the eagle in quadrant 1 of the reverse (\mathbf{X} , $\mathbf{10}$), not the "normal" quadrant 2 (like the other known Deventer coins, from other sub-types). Was this an intentional change by the mint (i.e. a new "sub-type"), or an error made by the die-sinker?

There is a coin in the Hollandsche Rading Find that matches the legends given by v.d. Chijs for this type, the only difference being that the Hollandsche Rading coin has its eagle in the usual quadrant 2, making it a "v.d. Chijs X, 10 variant". But was it the coin that v.d. Chijs reported, with the eagle in an "odd" place, that was, in fact, the variant? (We would need more, similar specimens to be able to answer this question.)

V.d Chijs reports a MONETA DAVEVT legend (not DAVENT), and there was a MONITA (not MONETA) coin in the Hollandsche Rading Find; both of these legends are likely to be die-sinker errors. But what of the two coins in the Hollandsche Rading Find, each

with a reverse, inner legend that does not begin in quadrant 2, as do all of the other known coins? Errors or intentional variations?

Are the barless **A**'s seen on some coins minting marks? What about the undecorated collars? *Et cetera*. All of which leads to problems in determining whether a coin is an anomaly, or an example of a "new sub-type". The available literature and my own knowledge of the subject fails us here.

There are at least six "sub-types" in the Hollandsche Rading find that are not listed in v.d. Chijs, and some of these have further variations that may be indications that they should be cataloged as separate sub-types as well (e.g. **cat Types I-c** and **I-d**).

When the reverse is oriented with the initial cross of the outer legend at the top, we can see that the inner legend does not begin in quadrant 2 as it should, but rather in quadrant 1. This is a previously unreported (?) variant; there are no such coins listed in v.d. Chijs. Whether this is a die-sinker's error or an intentional change by the mint is difficult to say.

It is almost certain that the misspelling of MONETA is simply a die-sinker's error. Although we reported a pellet after MON on this coin in MONITA in the reverse, inner legend in our report on the Hollandsche Rading Find *leeuwengroten* (ref. 15), I have since studied these coins in more detail, and am now of the opinion that the apparent "pellet" is simply part of the 'foot' of the preceding \mathbf{n} . A comparison with the other JvA coins shows that the die-sinkers seem to have gone to quite a bit of trouble to ensure that all of the \mathbf{n} 's had 'feet'.

According to the MPO, this coin came from a different source than the other Utrecht *groten* in their auction 55 (Finder v 4/DR)^[14], but Paul Callewaert assures us that this same coin was also for sale on the auction website Catawiki, and that it is definitely one of the Finder v 4/DR, Hollandsche Rading coins^[13].

In November 2017, eight more Jan van Arkel, Utrecht *groten* made an appearance in MPO Auction 56. One of these coins (MPO 5816) had also appeared in MPO Auction 55 (MPO 5762), and had apparently not been sold (JvA-60). These coins were more of Finder v 4's Hollandsche Rading coins ^[14], leaving only one v 4 (DR) coin 'unaccounted for' (JvA-73). ^[15]

V.d. Chijs' next three sub-types are problematic. The first (X, 8) involves what is likely to be a die-sinker's misspelling (assuming that v.d. Chijs' description is accurate). Otherwise, the coin appears to be a Deventer coin with trefoils as decoration and triple pellets as interpunction. No such coin is listed by v.d. Chijs (other than the example with the misspelled DAVEVT).

The second sub-type (X, 9) show a mixing of interpunction between obverse and reverse, which is something we have only seen once on any example, and is therefore suspect (see cat. Type II e, coin JvA-71 below, with mixed interpunction). But this and the third sub-type (X, 10) only have one trefoil by the shield. V.d. Chijs X, 10 has triple pellets (only) as interpunction, and furthermore, the eagle on the reverse is not in the usual quadrant 2.

Again: there is no Deventer sub-type listed by v.d. Chijs with two trefoil decorations by the shield, and triple pellet interpunction.

This is an interesting and unusual coin. It would appear that there is a pellet after TRA and a pierced rosette before IECTENSIS by the shield, unlike any of the other known examples. Note as well the curlicue $\mathbf{\Omega}$'s and barless \mathbf{A} 's.

There is a pellet to the right of the shield, and a pierced rosette to the left. These pierced rosettes are repeated on the bishop's mitre and on the brim, and again at the ends of 2 of the septifoil arcs. The bishop's collar appears to be free of decoration. Nothing like this is described in v.d. Chijs' book; as far as I know this is a unique and otherwise unpublished piece (other than on p. 21 of my original report on the Hollandsche Rading *leeuwengroten*, where I only pointed out the curlicue \mathbf{R} 's, and not the unusual marks by the shield or the other pierced rosettes).

The MPO auction catalogs did not report that these coins were from the Hollandsche Rading (2016) Find, nor that this piece is a unique and otherwise unknown sub-type of Jan van Arkel, bishop's head *groot*.

It is unclear whether or not there is a second rosette before IECTENSIS on the obverse.

The letter forms of the EN of IOHANES and the NE of TRAIECTENSIS on the obverse seem to be of some importance, but the Hollandsche Rading coins do not (exactly) match the descriptions, transcriptions and illustrations provided by v.d. Chijs.

No other combinations are listed by v.d. Chijs. The Hollandsche Rading coins with **Q**E, which would at first glance seem to be **v.d. Chijs X**, **6** coins, do not match v.d. Chijs' drawing for his **X**, **6**, since they all seem to have ***** EPCS (not EPS *****). There are no "**v.d. Chijs X**, **6**" coins in the Hollandsche Rading find, only "**v.d. Chijs X**, **6 var.**" coins.

Is v.d. Chijs' **X**, **6** drawing simply inaccurate (as is so often the case with his drawings/descriptions)? Or was he describing a different sub-type, not found in the Hollandsche Rading hoard?

The Type III coins are the only ones with Roman N's anywhere in the legends.

There appears to be a C in EPCS on the obverse, as opposed to the EPS in v.d. Chijs' drawing for his X, 6. The relevant E's or Θ 's are illegible. I can see no $\stackrel{\times}{\times}$ marks on the obverse... perhaps before EPCS. In theory, this is not a v.d. Chijs X, 5 coin because of the gothic \mathbb{R} in TRAIECTENSIS on the obverse.

If there are any marks by the shield they are invisible. The bishop's mitre clearly has **trefoils** as decoration; these same trefoils are found at the ends of the arcs of the septifoil surrounding the bishop; they are unlike the trefoils seen on the other coins (cf. JvA-71), and unlike the **x**'s shown in v.d. Chijs' **X**, **6** drawing.

Coin JvA-73 (v 4/ DR) is unaccounted for, no photos are known to exist, and its characteristics and sub-type remain completely unknown. This coin could have been the same as one of the others, or it may have been yet another new sub-type. It is likely that we will never know.

Previous Literature: Van der Chijs

There is little else to use as a reference for the medieval coins of Utrecht but v.d. Chijs (ref. 2). It is well known that when using v.d. Chijs as a reference, a few grains of salt must be taken along with the information. Throughout his works, there are a great many cases where v.d. Chijs' text description (legend transcriptions) and his illustrations do not match one another, leaving the reader to attempt to determine which (if either) is correct.

In addition, v.d. Chijs (and/or his illustrator) had a tendency to "play it a bit fast and loose" with the pellets: • \ddagger , which are often illustrated as annulets: •\$. The same is true of x's and stars.

Furthermore, v.d. Chijs himself admitted that he sometimes merged different (sub-) types of coins into one illustration... with disastrous results for subsequent researchers. The text descriptions and illustrations in v.d. Chijs cannot be blindly trusted to be 100% accurate.

V.d. Chijs erroneously refers to the bishop's head groot coins as dubbelgroten.

As we have already seen, many of the Hollandsche Rading coins matched up reasonably well with some of the sub-types described by v.d. Chijs, while others did not. It seems likely that v.d. Chijs' collar decorations, as illustrated, should not be trusted. It is clear from the actual coins that some of the 3-x collars have weak x's that look like there are only 2 x's, which may have caused problems for v.d. Chijs or his illustrator.

Type II-e) and combination of marks ($\frac{1}{2}/\frac{1}{2}$) is not listed by v.d. Chijs at all.



Chijs' text, the two symbols right and left of the shield at the bottom of the obverse are stars (specifically: $\star \star$). The drawing, however, seems to show 5-lobed rosettes or flowers.

It is clear that v.d. Chijs' cannot be trusted on the finest points of the descriptions and transcriptions.

In his text, v.d. Chijs does not actually explain what the "decoration" by the shield is (trefoil leaves?), saying only that it, and the interpunction, is "different". Presumably, the illustrator is trying to convey this mark: $\frac{1}{2}$ on the reverse of $\mathbf{n}^{0} \mathbf{4}$ (only?).

Using one obverse and two reverses as v.d. Chijs has done here is **never** a good idea. The obverse of one or the other (**3** or **4**) is almost guaranteed to be incorrectly illustrated.





According the v.d. Chijs, the only difference on the reverse between his **X**, **5** and **X**, **6** is the form of the **M** in NOME.

There are no examples of "v.d. Chijs X, 6" in the Hollandsche Rading, only several examples of a variant (?) thereof. These extant coins have a double x mark after IOHANES, and the spelling EPCS, just like the X, 5 coins. There is no sign of any double x mark after EPCS (not the EPS given by v.d. Chijs). This Hollandsche Rading sub-type is not listed in v.d. Chijs at all.

The basic difference between v.d. Chijs X, 5 and v.d. Chijs X, 6 {var.} is that the former has an NE and EN combination on the obverse, while the latter has **D**E and **ED**.





V.d. Chijs' text gives barless **A**'s, but the illustration shows **A**'s with crossbars. Furthermore, the text give DAVENT, while the illustration (and all the known coins) have DAVE**N**T; this is almost certainly an error on v.d. Chijs' part.

Once again, v.d. Chijs is playing it "fast and loose" with the pellets, which he transcribes as annulets (and x as \star). V.d. Chijs specifically points out the difference between obverse and reverse interpunction.

V.d. Chijs describes his n° 10 as having the eagle in a different quadrant on the reverse with no further information; he thus implies that the differing interpunction from X, 9 appears on this sub-type as well, although this does not seem to be the case in the drawing of v.d. Chijs X, 10.

Note as well that there is no mark after IHV in the drawing of v.d. Chijs X, 10, while there is in the drawing of v.d. Chijs X, 9 (this too is unmentioned by v.d. Chijs in his text).

V.d. Chijs makes no note of the fact that his drawings show two trefoils by the shield for **X**, **8**, but only one for **X**, **9** and **X**, **10**.

Note the curlicue $\mathbf{\Omega}$, as well as the eagle in quadrant 1 (not quadrant 2) and the barless A's. There is no apparent mark after EPC on the obverse.

Previous Literature: Van der Meer

There were a number of Utrecht bishop's head *groten* in the Arnhem Hoard (1957), as reported by G. v.d. Meer (ref. 16).

V.d. Meer (Item 10 a-e) cites v.d. Chijs as a reference, but she does not align her items with v.d. Chijs' numbers (except her 10 e).
